I-III, and the author of A World-Class Transportation System. He hosts the Strong Towns Podcast and is a primary writer of Strong Towns' web content. He has presented Strong

Towns concepts in hundreds of cities and towns across North America and in 2017 was named one of the 10 Most Influential Urbanists of all time by Planetizen. Marohn is a long-time commentator on KAXE Northern Community Radio, and he currently cohosts KAXE's *Dig Deep* program, a monthly examination of public policy issues affecting Minnesotans.
